PRESBYTERIANS IN EARLY SASKATOON

We will pick up the story about 51^{st} General Assembly held in Toronto stretching two weeks from June 3 - 16, 1925.

Tensions and ill will permeated in a way that was not typical. Finally, after a 25-year-old plan to join with the Methodists and Congregationalists to form the United Church, the Unionists thought they had done everything necessary to reach that goal.

As stated in an earlier report, the system of who could attend General Assembly was fraught with manipulation and scheming to achieve Union.

At the Presbyterian level, many commissionaires appointed were in favour.

Further, many of the smaller churches were lied to. One church complained that they had been told they did not have to vote. In the case of the Montreal, Presbytery were opposed yet somehow of the 26 representatives sent, 26 voted for Union! Smells off!

In the case of P.E.I. and Nova Scotia, they also had been purposely sabotaged. The Pro-Union had 71 commissionaires to represent 7,775 yet there were only two to represent 3,432.

The motion to join the United Church was read. Rev. W.G. Brown representing only 70 appointed, tried to read a carefully-written objection. He was told, "no, he could not read it" as they were out of time, yet the prepared rebuttal to Brown's unread paper was permitted to be read and was loudly cheered.

Those 70 opposing knew that, once the Moderator called for an adjournment, it would be over. They also knew if they had over forty attending the Assembly, they would be able to form a quorum and they would be allowed to start with a new Assembly. Things were so tight that Rev. Brown was the keeper at the gate so that they had enough sitting in the Assembly as they knew that the Pros were ready to pounce any time. Rev. Brown allowed only a certain number to be absent at a time. They had to check in with him and could only rotate short breaks.

Very abruptly, the Moderator called for the closing of the present Assembly. When the Moderator pronounced the benediction and the delegates backing the Moderator filed out (probably with smug faces), the 70 men opposing did not stand nor leave. They moved to the side of the church and had Rev. Dr. McQueen from Edmonton to take the chair. The Unionists still did not give in easily, got their Organist to play the Hallelujah so loudly trying to drown them out.

Despite the attempt, they arranged to gather at another church, Knox later that evening.

Knox was filled to overflowing and at exactly 12:00 midnight, the hour when The Church Union Act came into effect.

They had Rev. Ephriam Scott, editor of The Presbyterian Record for years, elected as the new Moderator of The General Assembly.

Rev. Scott called upon the whole congregation to rise and sing, "Oh God Our Help In Ages Past". It was an historic and memorable time. June 10, 1925 was the beginning of a new and energized Presbyterian Church.

This is the shortest version of this struggle and rebirth. After intense and sometimes confusing information, I now realize how deeply Saga cut into the hearts of so many remaining Presbyterians. During this long journey, friends became foes, families had brothers lose relations with brothers or other family members.

For many years, many struggled to come to a place of forgiveness, but never forgot.

As new generations came on board, they eventually did not have to struggle with forgiveness. We, as third, fourth and fifth generations should not forget. I believe this story helps people know and understand.

I hope new generations will move forward with love, understanding, to carry our church forward with acknowledgement and gratitude to those who lived and worshipped God,

Bishar, a 13-month-old boy from Sudan, was showing signs of illness for several days when a community health worker from Trocaire visited his home. Already stressed by the difficulties of providing for her family, Bishar's mother, Nuria Mohamed, was deeply worried about his condition.



By measuring Bishar's upper arm circumference, the community health worker discovered that he was severely malnourished and referred him to the hospital. During his three-week stay, Bishar received dedicated care and medical intervention and was soon allowed to return home. His recovery brought hope to his family. Nuria expressed immense gratitude for the staff's dedication and the hospital's assistance in saving her son's life.
