PRESBYTERIANS IN EARLY SASKATOON

On Sunday morning, January 18, 1925, the Masonic Temple was quickly filled.

The organist was Miss Elizabeth Pilbeam. The leader of hymns and soloist was Mr. Thomas Skinner.

They had no hymnals so Miss Dorothy McFarlane mimeographed sheets.

Rev. Donald Munro preached at both morning and evening services. His words were full of encouragement. The politics of the struggles were not mentioned.

He helped make the services feel like a new beginning and the purpose was to worship God. John Porteous carried his large family Bible for scripture readings.

A congregational meeting was held after the evening service.

John L. McKinnon made a motion to officially form a new presbyterian church: the name St. Andrew's was chosen. The decision was made to open a roll for signatures of those who wished to identify themselves with the new congregation.

(On October 18, 1925, the list of Charter Members was officially opened and closed December 27, 1925.) A Provisional Board of Managers agrees to act from January to October.

At the first meeting on January 18, 1926, the Provisional Board of Managers was elected, John Porteous

A motion was made by John Porteous/Seconded A. Munro that 250 copies of the Presbyterian Book of Praise be purchased.

The formation of the Boys' Club was the first organization to be formed within the congregation. On January 18, 28 teenage boys met at the home of Fraser MacDonald.

All in all, this was a special day, remembered for many years by those who attended. This was the beginning of something new and enthusiasm and commitment were high.



MISSION MOMENT

Georgina Musah became physically impaired due to polio at age five. She was stigmatized due to her disability and prevented from attending school in her community of Suamvuus in northern Ghana. Identified in a community survey by the PWS&Dsupported Community-Based Rehabilitation (CBR) Program, Georgina received physiotherapy and a tricycle for mobility. Georgina also took part in



training in climate-resilient farming and dressmaking, enabling her to generate an income and improve her life. "My profound gratitude to the CBR and PWS&D for changing my life through well-structured interventions. I have enough from my livelihood activities to fend for myself and my children and to support my husband. God bless and sustain your work," she shares.
