<u>In Our Wider Community</u>

PRESBYTERIANS IN EARLY SASKATOON

While not directly related to St. Andrew's, in 1926, the Board of Home Missions opened a Mission College south of the City in the Grasswood area. It was set up by James Alan Munro with some help by University students.

Later, the charge was moved to the City and became Calvin Presbyterian Church. The Church was built on the corner of Lorne Avenue and Hilliard Street.

Charlie Parsons wrote a fine account, "The History of Calvin Presbyterian Church 1926-1972." Some from St. Andrew's moved to Calvin for support and development. In 1972, Calvin and

Goforth Church amalgamated and the new Church now called Calvin-Goforth built a new building on the corner of Sommerfeld Avenue and 3rd Street East.





1927 – Mrs. Ben Johnston became the Supt. Of the Cradle Roll at St. Andrew's. She faithfully made baptismal certificates and annual birthday cards. There were many children, but she visited the children at home. She loved every child and kept track of "her children". She faithfully served for over 24 years.

On July 3, 1927, there was a National Thanksgiving, so the people of Canada could celebrate the Diamond Jubilee of Confederation. The Government sent out an Order of Service to all churches in Canada. It specified that services were to be held at exactly 2:30 o'clock (local time) on July 3, 1927.

One major endeavour of the women of the Church (with lots of help by men) was having a food booth at the Saskatoon Exhibition.

A coal and wood range was set up at their site. Open-canvas tents with many tables were also set up. Their booth was one of the largest. Endless amounts of wood and water had to be brought to the booth – so men and boys pitched in.

A feature was the home-made pies made at the Church by the older women who would not be able to stand up to the heat and gruelling cooking and serving that was done at the Exhibition. For many years, this was an annual fundraiser. St. Andrew's was famous for good food and cleanliness.

On September 1, 1928, the Kirk Session recommended James Alan Munro to the Presbytery of Saskatoon as a student in Theology at Knox College.

In the Fall of 1928, the Brown Family moved into the Manse located at 535 – 24th Street East, Saskatoon.

St. Andrew's was thriving and growing.

Figures of Saskatoon's population in relation to Presbyterian numbers:

From the years 1911 – 1921, Saskatoon's population grew from 12,000 to over 25,000 and 30% of the population identified as Presbyterian (7,870).

The next ten years 1921 – 1931 again saw a huge population increase from 25,000 to over 43,000. However, the number of Presbyterians in 1931 decreased in number to just over 5,000.

Of course, this time frame indicated the number of Presbyterians who joined the United Church in 1925.

By 1931, the United Church claimed 13,501 followed closely by 10,313 Presbyterians (who now formed 8% of the City's population.
