<u>In Our Wider Community</u>

On Sunday, March 16, there will be an exciting concert on the Pipe Organ at Knox United Church, Saskatoon. Montreal organist Jean-Willy Kunz will be performing at 7 P.M. Mr. Kunz is a well known performer in Canada.

He is organist-in-residence for the Montreal Symphony Orchestra, professor of organ for the Conservatory of Music in Montreal, artistic director for the Canadian International Organ Competition and organist for the church of Saint-Jean-Baptistes de Montreal. We are very privileged to have Mr. Kunz in Saskatoon and would like to welcome him with an enthusiastic audience.

PRESBYTERIANS IN EARLY SASKATOON

To coincide with the dedication and first service of the new building, the first issue of the Blue Banner was presented.

Rev. Brown, no doubt, had a hand in getting it ready for printing, but it was issued by the Boys' Club. The Blue Banner gave an overview of the church activities from January, 1925 to October, 1926. Included is a profile article of Rev. Brown.

The Women's Club gave a summary submitted by Margaret Hill (Secretary). The report tells of the various ways they raised money for the Church.

The total raised was \$1,135.90. With that money, they paid cash for the Thomas Orchestral Organ and bought the entire light fixtures "with a little left over"!

Other group reports were from the Choir and the Women's League, who said that they started with 29 members and soon grew to 60 members. The Sabbath School Report provided a good overview that shows how important it was in those days. The Sabbath Schools were held in various areas in the City. There were 250 students at Nutana School, 60 at the Church base, and 80 at the Wilson School Branch. Pleasant Hill had 40, Albert School group numbered 40, Thornton had 35. In total, that would be close to 500!

No wonder, in those days, every adult had to take a turn teaching!

The Girls' Club reported having about 40 members. They had wiener roasts, skating parties and other gatherings. This group, wanting to be a part of raising funds for the church, by holding home baking sales, afternoon teas, and a candy sale. They were assisted by their mothers who taught them "how to do it"! They raised \$75.

Other groups submitting reports were the Choir, the Auxiliary of the Women's Missionary Society and the Auxiliary of Young Women.

I save my favourite report for the last: The Report of The Boys' Club: the leadership of Fraser McDonald, Rev. Brown and many others were factors in making this group a success. Obviously, they wrote their own report and included details important to them. Their report describes how they entered both Senior and Junior teams in the Rotary Rugby League. Other teams in this League included Wesley, Knox and the Hilltops. Their Report tells how the Junior Team, in the finals against the Hilltops, cinched the win and concluded with "our joy is now complete"!

Their venture into the Church Hockey League was even more detailed, with actual scores reported of many games.

You must be asking the question, "How did they attract so many boys?" First of all, to be able to play on a team, one had to attend church on Sunday.

Hockey, in 1925-26, was the influence of church attendance being over 50%. Imagine, today, if we had over 50 boys attending each Sunday!

A further incentive was that any boy who attended church on 45 Sundays out of 54 weeks earned a specially-designed crest. This group was active in other areas.

Their gift to the church was tables they made to be used at banquets, etc.

The report concluded with the phrase, "with a little help from our Dads"!

The special focus on serving Sunday School, Boys' and Girls' Clubs, took the support and "hands-on" approach of many adults resulting in a vibrant, inclusive church community.

Overcoming Adversity in Ghana

Abdul Razak Ayawin, a 23-year-old from Bugri community in Northern Ghana, faced a life-altering accident that led to the amputation



of his left leg. Unable to continue his education due to financial constraints and fear of stigma, Razak was distraught.

Then, the Presbyterian Church of Ghana's Community-Based Rehabilitation (CBR) program identified him to provide support. Razak enrolled in a dressmaking apprenticeship and received a sewing machine and a small stipend. He learned quickly, became self-employed and gained confidence in his new skills.

The CBR program, which is supported by PWS&D, also facilitated his assessment for a prosthetic limb. Despite the financial challenges, Razak is determinedly raising funds so that he can get the prosthetic. "I am working hard to raise enough with the dresses that I am making for my customers. I hope I will be able to get the prosthesis. Thanks for your love and support," he expresses.

This Lenten season, faithfully respond to Christ's call to help ensure people have the tools they need to create a livelihood and learn new skills.
