PRESBYTERIANS IN EARLY SASKATOON

The sod for the new church was turned on August 27, 1951. John L. McKinnon, first Clerk of Session, had the Honors!

The last service was held in the old church December 30, 1951.

For a year, the Congregation worshipped at the First Baptist Church, corner of 4th Avenue and 25th Street. Services were at 3:00 p.m.

The cornerstone was laid on October 21, 1951 by Rev. James Alan Munro. His family, Archie Munro, wife and six children had all been charter members in 1925. Rev. Munro was the first student Minister out of St. Andrew's in 1928.

Here are some facts:

Architect: D. Webster

Contractor: Mr. Gilbert – fee \$5,600

Builder: W.J. Tubby and Sons – bid \$11,200 without some inclusions such as doors, and upgrade shingles.

Dimensions:

Height – floor to roof – 36 feet

Main floor – 38 feet wide; front to back 56 feet.

Seating capacity 342 with 90 in gallery and choir loft – 46.

Costs:

At every step, decisions had to be made, mainly in choice. Furnishings were not included in the contract.

The pews, including installation and shipping, cost \$7,925.

The window choice was extreme, to many. From the beginning of planning, the wish was to have a large, stained glass window in memory of Rev. Brown. The cost was \$2,610. Over years, there have been some questioning of honoring a specific person. (One person, who was a member briefly, wanted to cover up Rev. Brown's name).

If one reads the dedication, it reads:

"To the Glory of God . . . and Rev. Brown. For most people, the window has brought joy, hope and comfort and a sense of belonging in the family of God.

The cost of the linoleum was \$3,480. Not one person gets emotional while walking on it each Sunday!

The smaller side stained glass windows were paid for by individual people in memory of a loved one.

The main pulpit was given in memory of the Munro Family. The Lecturn was in memory of the Smith Family. The baptismal font was given by Mr. and Mrs. Tait and the Communion Table was by Dorothy McFarland. Four Communion Chairs were given in memory of John L. McKinnon by his Family.

The Memorial Organ was given by the Women's League.

People who did not have deep pockets paid for pew Bibles. Fifty Bibles were placed and were just as meaningful.

At last, the Church opened on January 11, 1953. Rev. James Alan Munro preached at both morning and evening services. At 3:00 p.m., he dedicated the windows.

"I could not get medical help in time because we did not have enough money," says 65-year-old Ruqaiya, who lives in Afghanistan. Ruqaiya's life took a challenging turn ten years ago when she fell on ice, resulting in partial paralysis. Despite



her impairment, she helps care for her youngest son, who has a hand impairment, two daughters-in-law, and two young grandchildren while her two oldest sons work as porters in Kabul, struggling to earn enough. Before her injury, Ruqaiya was known for her skill in weaving and was able to earn a decent income. Now unable to weave, she faces significant financial hardship, made worse by the political and economic situation in the country. Relief came when Ruqaiya received cash assistance through a PWS&D-supported project. She purchased essentials like oil, pulses, flour, rice and salt, meeting her family's food needs during the harsh winter.
