PRESBYTERIANS IN EARLY SASKATOON

In 1925, when St. Andrew's Church started, it was never intended to make their first building permanent. In 1928, Rev. Brown obtained a significant amount to start a Building Fund. The Great Depression and World War II put on hold the building of a new structure. The dream never died and tiny pockets of money were saved in a special account. In the meantime, St. Andrew's was a vibrant and active congregation that focused on worship, mission and community.

Finally, on February 17, 1947, the first meeting was held to turn the vision into reality. It is important to give the names of those who became the Building Committee. Members from the Board of Managers were S. McKercher, James Tait, Peter Dawson, Wm. Kerr and P. Butler. Session was represented by John L. Mackinnon, A.G. Sinclair and Rev. Eoin MacKay.

Over the next six years, some new names were added, but our present building would never have been built if the dedication and hard work of the original men had not taken the first step. S. McKercher was appointed Chairman and Percy Butler as Secretary. It must be noted that most of facts at meetings would have been lost, had Butler not preserved the steps in detailed minutes. His style of recording and reporting meetings were much more than recording facts. Without meaning to, he also captured the spirit. It seemed that all checked their egos at the door. A typical meeting would be everyone saying a suggestion or opinion. No one vigorously pushed their own opinion, and the spirit of making decisions was for the goal of building the best for the Church community.

Rev. Eoin MacKay was the right minister for the task of setting the tone. He presented suggestions like others, but he knew how the larger Church functioned and thus helped the Committee from making decisions that were not aligned with Church policy. Early, he said the task was too overwhelming and that a subcommittee be formed to deal with finances. The original members of the Finance Committee were: George Munro, Wm. Kerr, O. McMillan, D. Stewart, J. Gregor, John L. MacKinnon, Roy Early, S. McKercher, P. Dawson and Rev. MacKay.

They printed pledge cards and a letter and, in teams of two, visited the homes of members and adherents.

The letter read as follows:

Dear Friends:

We are happy to present to you the plans for our new Church. We are very pleased with them and feel sure you will share our enthusiasm. Here is a Church which will be a credit to the congregation and to Saskatoon and the whole Presbyterian Church in Canada. More importantly, it will be an inspiring place for the public worship of God – well equipped to carry on the work He has committed to us . . . We have aimed at providing a beautiful sanctuary for worship and adequate accommodations and equipment for the various phase of the Church's work while, at the same time, avoiding the nonessential, luxurious and unnecessary expenditures.

Examples of adding unnecessary costs: at first, it was to be of stone. That would have added around \$50 to \$75 thousand more than the brick. They wisely went for the brick. They had originally planned for a seating capacity of 600 but the size of the building was cut by 10 feet in width thus saving \$40 thousand. Seating capacity would now be 500 people.

Through gifts to Presbyterians Sharing, the Presbyterian Church in Canada supports many vital outreach ministries across Canada. One such ministry is Rivière des Prairies, a mission of the Presbytery of Montreal that plays a significant



role in outreach within the city's east end. This mission focuses on connecting with immigrants where there is a growing presence of new Canadians, mainly from Cameroon. Rivière des Prairies celebrates multilingualism in its church services and children's programming, creating an open and welcoming space for newcomers to Canada. Through these efforts, the mission fosters a strong sense of community and supports individuals on their shared faith journey.
