PRESBYTERIANS IN EARLY SASKATOON

By around 1900, there was an overflow of settlers from American West, Europe and Eastern Canada.

Further growth in population occurred when Rev. Isaac Barr purchased a large tract of land around the present-day Lloydminster. The Colonists arrived in Saskatoon but, without good leadership by Rev. Barr, conditions were poor and, for a few months, they camped out in tents. Their presence put strain on local businesses.

For example: "The Phoenix" newspaper reported that 1,000 cars with settlers' effects arrived. Local businesses flourished selling 800 wagons, 800 ploughs, 130 mowers, 50 binders and 1,000 horses. Some of the colonists chose to stay in Saskatoon, while most moved on.

In 1903, Saskatoon grained town status and, in the fall of 1904, the Presbyterians of (old) Knox held a special Thanksgiving Service.

In the early years, there was a spirit of co-operation amongst all denominations. For example, when the Bishop of the new Anglican Church, St. John's, was to hold the dedication, all the Presbyterians were informed there would be no service in their church, so they could go to the St. John's dedication.

In 1905, the main line of the CNR was completed as far as North Battleford. So, the stage coach service was dropped!

1906 was a milestone year. On May 26. Riversdale, Saskatoon and Nutana merged to form the City of Saskatoon.

The growth of the Presbyterian Church in Saskatoon matched the rapid growth of the City. An addition had been added to (old) Knox for 100 more people.

In 1906, at the annual meeting, \$2,000 was raised and, in 1907, plans were made for a further addition to accommodate 200 more people. This addition cost \$2,000. Meanwhile, the Ladies of the Church were busy raising money to build a manse.

MISSION MOMENT

In Guatemala, gender-based violence has been and continues to be one of the most obvious forms of gender inequality. To address this, PWS&D is supporting a project that



speaks to the problem of violence against women. Adolescents and young women participate in workshops where they learn about their rights and build their self-esteem and dignity. In addition, the project raises awareness among young men through workshops where they learn about machismo, identify what violence against women looks like and promote commitments to eliminate it.

Saturday, November 2 We pray that God will strengthen those displaced by conflict in Gaza as they receive support from PWS&D's partners, including food assistance, health care and psychological support.
